How To Write A Great Second Act For Your Screenplay



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Opening Pages Checklist:

- 1. Your opening pages should establish the tone and genre of the film.
- 2. Your opening pages should Introduce your protagonist.
- 3. Your opening pages should set up the main dramatic situation that your film is going to be about.
- 4. Your opening pages should Indicate the theme or message of your movie.

AND (really, these last 4 apply to the entire screenplay)

- 5. Your opening pages must make the reader feel like you know what you're doing.
- 6. Your opening pages must never bore the reader.
- 7. MOST IMPORTANT: Your opening pages must make the reader feel something. Sadness. Fear. Horror. Pain. Laughter. Joy. Shock.
- 8. Bonus point: A competent writer can juggle a dozen balls at the same time.



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First Act Checklist:

- 1. Set up the protagonist's normal world, but not with mundane scenes that don't pertain to the rest of the story!
- 2. Have a clear inciting incident.
- 3. Push your protagonist against the call to action to develop character. Debate section.
- 4. Understand the meat of your story so you have a clear act break.

- O Break into Two (25)
- B Story (30)
- \circ Fun and Games (30-55)
- o Midpoint (55)
- Bad Guys Close In (55-75)
- O All Is Lost (75)
- O Dark Night of the Soul (75-85)
